History..... Areas of land in the village being developed for housing have their own story to tell..... The small development at 'Pippin Close' on the opposite side to the Swan pub is a case in point. In medieval times it was part of a large open field called 'North Field' and was part of the Hampden Estate of Great Kimble Manor. Some parts of the estate land- such as 'Grangelands' were farmed directly by the estate but North Field was farmed by tenants.

In 1349 a terrible epidemic of Bubonic Plaque hit the country and Mark Reed in his book on the History of the Buckinghamshire Landscape points out that Great Kimble manor had no tenants left by 1352. There was also a chronic shortage of labour so the estate parcelled out some 4 acre plots of land which could be sold on favourable terms to attract agricultural workers. One such was Bateman's Close which occupied 4 acres at the end of Bridge Street. The tenants would still have to work for the estate to afford the mortgage on the land. In other cases the new yeomen farmers failed because they grew the same crops as the estate and so were often unable to work their own land successfully at busy times such as ploughing, harvest and threshing time. The Batemans diversified and instead of growing grain crops they planted an orchard, which almost certainly was mixed with livestock, possibly pigs, on their close. Some of the closes were later

repurchased by the estate but at the time of enclosure [1805] Batemans Close retained its identity. The footpath - which used to be a droveway for cattle - takes a small left turn at the stile at the boundary of Bateman's Close.
